 <p>STRIPED BASS Lake Lanier</p> <p>Tips: Look for good structure near channels to be holding plenty of bait. Stripers won't be far away. Down-lining a live shad or herring is the best way to attract a strike.</p>	 <p>LARGEMOUTHS Dodge County PFA</p> <p>Tips: During cold snaps, fish a jig-and-pig extremely slowly to attract a big bite. When the weather warms, move shallow and bump a plug through any wood cover you can locate.</p>	 <p>WHITE BASS Coosa River</p> <p>Tips: Fish a jig-and-grub combo on bottom in current to catch scrappy white bass. The bigger females tend to hold deeper than the males, so adjust your jig size accordingly as current and depth require.</p>	 <p>RAINBOW TROUT Coopers Creek</p> <p>Tips: Trout fishing on this heavily stocked stream is a communal affair near the campgrounds on the lower end. Work your way upstream to find less-pressured and wild fish.</p>	 <p>BLUEGILLS Lake Seminole</p> <p>Tips: Count on the mayfly hatch to turn the bream on this month as the fish feed on the bugs dropping from the sky. Look for swarms of the flies on shoreline vegetation and target the bream waiting below.</p>	 <p>LARGEMOUTHS Bartletts Ferry Lake</p> <p>Tips: The best bass fishing is at night. Look for the lighted docks to attract bait and bass after darkness falls. Try a pearl-colored soft-plastic jerkbait around the lighted areas.</p>

 <p>BROWN TROUT Chattahoochee River</p> <p>Tips: The best fishing occurs when the water is low and clear. Float the river, or wade a shoal, tossing a small in-line spinner on ultralight spinning tackle.</p>	 <p>TARPON Ogeechee River</p> <p>Tips: Calm days allow small boat anglers to get out in the sounds. Fish live pogies near shallow bars and tidal rips on an incoming tide for the chance to hook one of these sil-ver kings.</p>	 <p>HYBRID BASS Lake Hartwell</p> <p>Tips: Finding good structure is the key to a productive fishing trip. Some anglers prefer to fish at night when lights can be used to attract bait and hybrids. The area near dam is a prime site in which to look.</p>	 <p>LARGEMOUTHS Weiss Lake</p> <p>Tips: Fish the shallow backwater sloughs on the lake's upper end. Fast-moving plugs retrieved in and around shallow cover produce crushing strikes from bass feeding on shad prior to the onset of winter.</p>	 <p>SEATROUT Altamaha Sound</p> <p>Tips: Trout are moving into estuaries for the winter. Expect the fish to be concentrated in deep holes. A jig retrieved along the bottom draws strikes, or stick with drifting a live shrimp on a deep float rig.</p>	 <p>SMALLMOUTHS Blue Ridge Lake</p> <p>Tips: Fish feed at night on shallow points. Cast or troll small crankbaits to attract a strike. Crawdad patterns are best since crawdads are the predominant forage in this infertile mountain lake.</p>
